

A fascinating place in Belper's history...


Belper's Unitarian chapel is hidden away up Field Row off Green Lane. It is of architectural interest and is the oldest place of continuous worship in the town.

The Act of Uniformity (1662) sought to impose a uniformity of belief and worship. Some clergy refused to conform and lost their living but several continued to preach – this was the beginning of non-conformist worship. In 1689 John Taylor obtained a licence to hold services at his house in Belper and this was the beginning of the non-conformist movement here. In 1721 a meeting house was built on Green Lane.

Jedediah Strutt harnessed the power of the River Derwent and built his cotton spinning mills in Belper from 1776 – these are now part of the Derwent Valley Mills World Heritage Site. He built houses and developed a community for his workers. Jedediah was a Unitarian and built the present chapel in 1788 – it was extended a few years later and the chapel cottage added at that time.

The stone chapel has a cantilevered stairway leading to the gallery. Most of the interior is original with box pews, commemorative plaques and a John Whitehurst clock. There is an arched catacomb beneath the boxed pews where Strutt family members are interred. Jedediah Strutt himself is buried beneath the catacomb.
